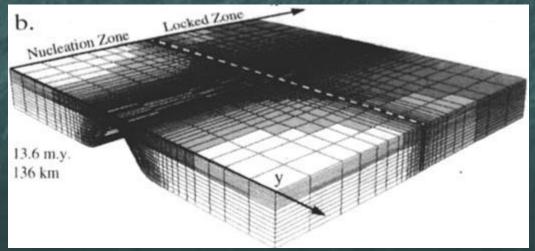

<u>New Developments</u> (current rift-modeling codes all stokes): melting/melt transport/freezing erosion, sediment transport, deposition

## Why Deal.II?

Easy to change model => questions/physics evolve Easy to test solvers, pre-conditioners, etc. Easy to jump from 2D to 3D Attract geodynamics community – we can be geodynamicists, not C++ or Math experts
